They Did It!

I just returned from Ak Chiy in Kyrgyzstan, after spending a week with my family, and opening the newly renovated abandoned classroom, now a community resource center, in Rakymov Secondary School.

As you may remember, I had to abandon a successful grant application for the resource center when I left Peace Corps early. After a month or two last summer feeling sorry for myself, and for my village, I realized the people there who would do all the work were still there - I was just an instigator and organizer of the effort. I could still perform those functions in Montana - all we needed was a replacement funding scheme. With agreement from my Ak Chiy partners, we proceeded apace.

The Livingston Center for Art and Culture, a local NGO I'd worked with before, agreed, with some trepidation, to help me raise the funding - for a project where? Definitely not something they'd done before, but thank goodness they were game to help, and stuck with me through various trials.





The project was clearly defined in the grant application, with a 10% contingency built in, so we were able to complete with very few minor changes. We also surmounted the challenges of a changing government structure in the area, and getting dollars to the village development account free of excessive fees and thieving hands. Most of the thanks go to my counterpart, Izat, and to project commission treasurer Kazybek.


